This past year taught us a lot of things; most importantly, that the world as we know it can change overnight. Change and uncertainty has been at the forefront of our daily lives for more than 18 months, so has the importance of supporting the local community organizations delivering essential, frontline programs. Even amid a global pandemic, United Way Newfoundland and Labrador has remained committed to investing in programs that ensure this province is truly great for everyone. These programs have a focus on building strong communities, moving people from poverty to possibility and helping kids be all that they can be.

Last year, thanks to the generosity of our donors, UWNL was able to raise critical funds to support children, seniors, families and communities across Newfoundland and Labrador by way of 31 Community Fund grants. In addition, United Way Newfoundland and Labrador distributed an extra 127 grants as a response to Covid-19 through the locally funded Atlantic Compassion Fund and federally funded Emergency Community Support Fund.

UWNL also served a critical role in the implementation of 211 NL. 211 NL is a telephone and online directory that helps direct Newfoundlanders and Labradorians to critical community, social and government supports 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. UWNL is proud to be a founding partner of 211 NL, by providing funding and advocacy for the program, and remains committed to supporting 211 NL so that it is here to support our province through whatever may come our way.

To our donors, volunteers and community partners - I would like to offer my sincere gratitude and appreciation for your support of our work this past year. When you invest in your community through United Way Newfoundland and Labrador, you can trust that your gift is being used where it is needed most.

A NOTE FROM OUR BOARD CHAIR

The past year has been so laden with challenges that it's already becoming cliché, but I'd be remiss not to acknowledge the particular effect this has had on United Way Newfoundland and Labrador. Our organization is fueled by donation dollars (which were invariably affected by the pandemic) to fund projects for our most vulnerable citizens (the demand for which saw an understandable increase over the past twelve months). In the midst of our staff and volunteer board navigating virtual meetings and working from home, we undertook the major hiring process of a new Executive Director.

The story of the 2020-2021 year for our organization could have been a very different story. Instead, the message that I'm tasked with bringing is how United Ways across Canada were recognized for our collective expertise in the charitable sector and entrusted with unprecedented emergency funds, which represented more than two million dollars distributed in Newfoundland and Labrador by March 31, 2021. United Way Newfoundland and Labrador further assumed a major leadership role in the implementation of a 211 phone line for the first time in Newfoundland and Labrador, which has already proven to be a much-needed resource for connecting individuals to government and community-based health and social services. With the welcome additions of Katie Greene as our Executive Director (and now, in the interim, to Joe Browne), and an influx of new members around the boardroom table (or, for now, on the Zoom screen), United Way Newfoundland and Labrador remains a healthy, thriving community organization, and I've been proud to have served as Board Chair during this unpredictable time.

Don't get me wrong, the past year has not been without its challenges. We miss sharing food and music at the Touton Sliders and the Songs of the City event. We miss seeing all the recipients at the Community Fund cheque distributions. In short, we miss the community – and we can't wait to see you all again (in person, and definitely not on mute) in the near future.

Our Impact: 2020 Investments

Building Healthy People, and Strong Communities

Our families and neighborhoods are two of the most basic units of our lives. Strong communities are defined by their resilience, low incidence of violence, community affairs. We are working together to ensure that individuals, families, and communities have the for one another and to solve local problems.

Nukum Munik Shelter: Sheshatshiu Innu First Nation Sheshatshit



For over 20 years the Nukum Munik Shelter has been providing front-line support to the women in the Sheshatshiu Innu First Nation in northern Labrador. With 14 beds in their facility they are able to provide a safe haven for women and their children at the shelter. The shelter works tirelessly to give back to their community through different programs and activities. These help both the women and children in their care and the area as a whole feel more connected.

In 2020 the Sheshatshiu Innu First Nation received a Community Fund grant to help fund their "Sewing Together and Healing the Hurt" program. Given the remoteness of the community it can be difficult to find suitable activities to pass the time, especially in winter. The sewing program aims to change that by providing a safe environment for the women of the shelter to learn how to create their own traditional clothing for local events and ceremonies. The sewing projects will also become available to the wider community once the workers and clients of the shelter are well versed in the skill.

Thank you to all of our donors who make it possible, year after year, to support meaningful programs like these. With your support we are able to help build stronger communites every year.

COVID-19 Response: Keeping Communities Strong

When COVID-19 arrived, United Way Newfoundland and Labrador quickly mobilized to help support our communities as they contended with the many different effects of the pandemic.

The most vulnerable people of our province were hit the hardest, and as such we began to advocate on behalf of the local agencies that served them. Reaching out to our incredible partners, stakeholders, and other government agencies to find solutions to new problems, and to offer help and support to those with the biggest needs, was our goal throughout the pandemic response.

Thanks to funding provided by the Federal Government of Canada, and our local Atlantic business partners, United Way Newfoundland and Labrador was able to invest heavily in our province to support those who needed it the most. These investments were a part of the Atlantic Compassion Fund, the Emergency Community Support Fund, and the New Horizons for Seniors Program.

Atlantic Compassion Fund

We are incredibly proud to have collaborated with the 11 United Ways of Atlantic Canada to create the Atlantic Compassion Fund, which helped people struggling with the most basic needs during the pandemic. This fund focused on alleviating these needs by focusing on food, shelter, access to medications and mental health as priorities.

With support from the Government of Newfoundland and Labrador, individual, and corporate donors, we were able to provide support to 55 local charities and non-profits with 69 separate grants.



Emergency Community Support Fund

Recognizing the local reach and expertise of the United Way network, the Government of Canada entrusted us to quickly and effectively disburse funds through the Emergency Community Support Fund. Through this initiative we were able to provide further support to 73 local non-profits, invested into 110 crucial programs province-wide.



New Horizons for Seniors Program

The Government of Canada's New Horizons for Seniors program provided funding to support vulnerable seniors at risk due to COVID-19. United Way NL partnered with both the Canadian Red Cross and Seniors NL to provide support across the province. Volunteers provided meals, wellness checks, phone support, and more to seniors in need across Newfoundland and Labrador


