Hurricane Fiona Relief



In September 2022, the Port aux Basques area was devastated by the effects of Hurricane Fiona, with damage and devastation that is an anomoly in our province. In quick response, TD Bank stepped in and graciously provided UWNL with a special donation of \$15,000 to help address immediate needs in the areas most affected. This initiative allowed us to ensure that funds were directed to people for food and furniture through our partnerships with Home Again Furniture Bank, Food First NL, and the Port Aux Basque Food Bank. For their swift reaction to addressing community needs, we were proud to honor TD Bank with an award for showcasing their Local Love at our 2023 Community Celebration. 2022 Community Fund

Since 2005 UWNL has funded 769 community services and programs right here in Newfoundland and Labrador with a total of \$7,657,904.

In 2023, UWNL received 105 funding applications with a total ask of \$1,916,360. Although we would love to fund each and every organization that applies, it's just not possible. Our Community Fund Committee reviewed each application and based on need, awarded \$400,000 raised in 2022 to 42 programs and services in NL.





The Community Services Recovery Fund was a one-time investment of \$400 million, by the Government of Canada to help Community Service Organizations adapt, modernize, and be better equipped to improve the efficacy, accessibility, and sustainability of the community services that they are providing through the pandemic recovery and beyond.

UWNL is proud to have worked with United Way Centraide Canada as part of the Community Services Recovery Fund. This fund was a collaboration between the Canadian Red Cross, Community Foundations of Canada, and United Way Centraide Canada to provide funding to Community Service Organizations, including non-profit organizations, Indigenous Governing Bodies, and Registered Charities located in Canada. The Community Services Recovery Fund responds to what Community Service Organizations need right now and supports organizations as they adapt to the long-term impacts of the pandemic.
